Lawrence Reed is president of the Foundation for Economic Education (FEE) in Atlanta, Ga., and president emeritus of the Mackinac Center for Public Policy in Michigan. Previously, Reed taught economics at Midland's Northwood University for seven years, chairing the department for two years.

The author or editor of stx books, Reed has published more than 1,000 columns and articles that have appeared in journals and magazines, including the Wall Street lournal, USA Today, Policy Review, Regulation, and Investor's Business Daily. His most recent books are Are We Good Enough for Liberty? and A Republic-If We Can Keep It.

He has delivered more than 75 speeches per year in almost every state and dozens of foreign countries. Since 1985, he has visited
81 countries on six continents. His best-known lectures include "Seven Principles of Sound Policy," "Liberty and Character. The Indispensable Connection"
and "Creat Myths of the Great Depression" – all of which have been translated into more than a dozen languages and distributed worldwide. He writes frequently
